The Altar

Churches are buildings which are made to last. Using materials such as marble, granite and wood, craftsmen used their skills to create beautiful objects which would last for a long time.

Here is a photograph of the carved white high altar in our church and the beautiful five part stained glass window behind it. The altar was made of marble and was originally built and installed by Dublin sculptor, James Pearse for the opening of the church in September 1895. James Pearse was commissioned to build the three marble altars and the communion rails at a cost of £1,395.


